Explanation of the Socioemotional Selectivity Theory With ...

Socioemotional selectivity theory, proposed by Carstensen and colleagues, refers to changes that happen across the lifespan as a function of how time is viewed (Carstensen, 1992; Carstensen, Isaacowitz, & Charles, 1999). The theory states that younger individuals perceive time as more open-ended, and thus prioritize and pursue knowledge-related goals.

The theory maintains that as time horizons shrink, as they typically do with age, people become increasingly selective, investing greater resources in emotionally meaningful goals and activities. Socioemotional Selectivity Theory (SST) is grounded in the uniquely human ability to monitor time (Carstensen, 1993, 2006; Carstensen, Isaacowitz, & Charles, 1999). According to SST, a core constellation of goals operates throughout adulthood, including basic goals associated with attachment and control as well as goals associated with instrumental needs and emotional gratification.

The main assertion of socioemotional selectivity theory is that when boundaries on time are perceived, present-oriented goals related to emotional meaning are prioritized over future-oriented goals aimed at acquiring information and expanding horizons.
